PARENT TOOL KIT

We have a week full of fun and exciting adventures planned for your camper. After a half-day "explorer training" on Monday morning, campers will spend a day and half at each institution. Take a look at the schedule below to determine where your child will be on any given day.

WHAT'S INSIDE YOUR BACKPACK

Help your camper pack their backpack with these items:

- Water bottle and sunscreen.
- Peanut and tree nut free lunch. For the safety of all participants, it is required that lunches are free of products containing peanuts or tree nuts.
- Extra snacks and drinks. Please pack a little extra in your camper's lunch for healthy snacking.

Help your camper dress appropriately each day:

- Mandatory Summer World's Tour T-shirt- All campers will receive one camp t-shirt (inquire with your counselor if you wish to purchase more). Please be aware if a camper comes to camp without the mandatory t-shirt, and additional t-shirt must be purchased.
- Comfortable clothes- Summer World's Tour is all about exploring and sometimes the work gets a little messy. For our youngest campers, a set of spare clothes is a good idea.
- Closed toed shoes
- Lightweight jacket or sweatshirt or rain gear (if necessary). Some museums spaces will be a bit chilly

Adler Planetarium

This August, the Moon will start to block Chicago's view of the Sun convering up to 90% of its surface and creating a spectacular sight. Summer Worlds Tour campers will investigate the science of a solar eclipse at the Adler Planetarium and learn how to safely experience this year's solar eclipse.

- Tell me about the solar eclipse this summer! Can we see it from home? How can we view it safely?
- How did you detect UV light today? Where does UV light come from?
- Did you observe the sun today? What did it look like? What did you use to see it?

Field Museum

At The Field Museum, there are over 300,000 specimens in our collection, including everything from the smallest beetles to the largest dinosaurs. So, why do we have so many specimens? What can scientists learn from this collection? Summer Worlds Tour campers will have the chance to explore the unique special exhibit *Specimens: Unlocking the Secrets of Life* to learn more about what goes on behind the scenes of The Field Museum. Campers will have the opportunity to do some of the same tasks as our Field Museum scientists, such as collecting and organizing bones from owl pellets, studying specimens to create scientific illustrations, and examining fossils that are brought back to the lab.

- What types of things do scientists collect?
- What methods do scientists use to collect specimens?
- What can scientists learn from collections of specimens?

Shedd Aquarium

Chicago is placed along the shore of magnificent Lake Michicago and has the great Chicago River running through its center. On their full day at Shedd, Summer Worlds Tour campers will explore the natural behavior and management of water while learning about Chicago's unique watershed. On their half day at Shedd, campers will learn about the role that color plays in the aquatic world and the unique ways it impacts animals behavior.

- What are some things we can do at home to help protect Chicago's watershed?
- Why are there so many layers in your plant cup? What materials make each layer?
- What does your sun catcher represent and how did you make it?



Drop-Off Checklist: 8:30-9:00am

- Place parking placard (received the first day of camp) on dashboard when entering the queue. Park along curb and turn on hazard lights before exiting the car. This will give you 10 minutes of standing time.
- If you arrive after 9:00am, please drop off your very excited camper at their scheduled A.M. Museum.
- If someone other than you is picking up your camper, please let counselors know at dropoff time.

Note: In the event of inclement weather, you may be directed to drop-off/pick-up your camper at their am/pm museum. A message will be at (312) 322-0329 indicating if alternative drop-off/pick-up procedures are in use.

Pick-Up Checklist: 3:00-3:30pm

- □ Please be aware that if you arrive later than 3:30pm, you will be charged a late pick-up fee of \$5.00 for every five minutes.
- Place parking placard (received the first day of camp) on dashboard when entering the queue. Park along curb and turn on hazard lights before exiting the car. This will give you 10 minutes of standing time.
- Sign out your camper using your initial on the check-out sheet.
- Use the Car Ride Home Questions in this Tour Guide to find out what your camper did today.

Drop-off and Pick-up will take place at The Field Museum Bus Drop-off on the east side of the building in between the parking lot at the East Entrance.
